

Tremont Public Works

Tremont Public Works is the neighborhood's newest gallery, cafe and special event space featuring local art, culinary talent and commerce. This multi-purpose venue was founded by Fat Cats chef/owner Ricardo Sandoval as a new project for the property not to sit vacant following the departure of Trio. First order of business is to host public open house and exhibits for Walkabout Tremont (2nd Fridays), and market the space for private event rentals. The goal is to evolve by expanding public hours of operation through the involvement of artists, guest chefs and entrepreneurs to maximize the space in form of pop-ups and partnerships.

The collaborative culinary leadership team includes Chef Anthony Vicente of Flying Garlic and Chef Jack Anfang of Lava Lounge. Vicente's expertise was cultivated at Ferrandi Paris School, and posts at L'épi Dupin and Pierre Gagnaire (3 Michelin Stars). Anfang is a longtime chef and business partner of Sandoval involved at Fat Cats and Lava Lounge, and formerly Halite and Felice Urban Cafe.

Veteran employees of Fat Cats also contribute a diverse set of hospitality, communications and event planning skills. Together they will lead special programming and curated art exhibits. The (soft) grand opening took place October 11 for Walkabout Tremont with a makers market of local artists, vendors and DJ. The next scheduled event "The Art of Comedy" for November 8 from 6-10 PM exhibits works by Scott Pickering, Grace Frank, Kristen Richeson and live painting by James Quarles. The gallery and tasting room also hosts regional live stand-up comedians including Ryan Chernick, Katy Moynihan, Ray Roberts, Nick Harrison and Tim Cornett beginning at 8 PM. The cafe features beer, wine and small plates by chefs Sandoval and Vicente.

Western Cuyahoga Audubon Society-WCAS, a chapter of the National Audubon Society, is pleased to announce a week of urban birding events and activities with David Lindo www.theurbanbirder.com in Cleveland, Ohio from November 2nd through 9th, 2019.

David Lindo is Vice-President of the Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust and voted 7th most influential person in Wildlife by BBC Wildlife Magazine, Member of the British Guild of Travel Writers and a Fellow of the International League of Conservation Writers, Proud Ambassador for Leica Birding, London Wildlife Trust, Rare Bird Alert, EcoNoja Feria Internacional and the Colombia Bird Fair, President of The Friends of Suntrap Forest Education Centre, and author of several books including the newly published, *How to Be an Urban Birder*.

David Lindo's visit to northeast Ohio will celebrate the launch of Urban Birding Cleveland, a WCAS initiative for all ages of local birders. David's week long schedule of speaking engagements and birding activities is a perfect kick-off for the Urban Birding Cleveland initiative. David will present on his urban birding experiences around the world in an effort to raise awareness and educate people on the importance of preservation and conservation of bird and wildlife habitat.

The week will be filled with opportunities for the public to join David and Cleveland's expert bird walk leaders, birders, and dedicated citizen scientists on a series of urban bird walks and field trips that showcase northeast Ohio's iconic greenspaces and birding locations in Cleveland and the surrounding Emerald Necklace.

Tremont, Duck Island and Irishtown Bend Block Clubs Join in the Annual Holiday Food Drive for Our Neighbors in Need

This year, Metro North Block Club is inviting other block clubs to engage in "friendly competitions" to see which group could bring in the most in three (3) categories in the annual Tremont/Duck Island/Irishtown Bend Holiday Food Drive – of nonperishable food items and paper products along with cash and checks. The ultimate goal is to help food pantries, like St. Augustine, Pilgrim, St. John Cantius, St. Michael, Immanuel Lutheran, St. Malachi, Westside Catholic Center, and Greater Cleveland Food Bank to feed our near west families and children in need in the holiday season. The "Grand Prize Winner" for the 2018/2019 challenge was Metro North – therefore, they are issuing the challenge for the upcoming 2019/2020 season.

For the second season (2018/2019) featured the most participating block clubs (8): Auburn-Lincoln Park, Central Tremont, Duck Island, Holmden-Buhrer-Rowley/Mentor-Castle-Clark, Irishtown Bend, Metro North, and North of Literary – up from four (4) in 2014 – and were joined by a Tremont West staff team. Last season's holiday food drive featured the most canned goods, paper products, and non-perishable food items collected (6,614) – and the most money collected in cash and checks (\$15,142). For the purposes of the Grand Prize in last season's competition, which brought in more check donations than ever before, each dollar donated by check was considered equivalent to two items (for example a \$50 check donation was considered to be 100 items of canned goods or 100 points counted in the Grand Prize competition).

Last year, donations were taken to the food pantries at St. Augustine, Pilgrim, St. Michael, Westside Catholic Center in December– and late December donations were delivered in January, 2019 to all 8 food pantries to help re-stock for the new year.

Winterization Programs!!

It's on its way, the winter months in Cleveland! With the arrival of winter, so are the Winterization Programs. Tremont West Development Corporation has all the information you need to prepare for the winter months. There are several exciting programs to assist you in make this winter as comfortable as possible.

As in past years...CHN Housing Partners, formally Cleveland Housing Network, has several programs to assist with your utility bills. HEAP, PIPP, PIPP PLUS and CHN Housing Partners is a Winter/Summer Crisis site.

Dominion Energy Ohio has implemented there 2018-2019 Winter Heating Session. This would include;

Winter Reconnection Order (WRO) With a deposit, your heating service can be re-connected. This year, Dominion Energy Ohio (DEO) will accept a split payment with other utility providers.

Assistance Program This year, customers can receive a one-time 30 day credit hold, for scheduled assistance programs. DEO will accept appointment request from either a social service agency or the customer.

Disconnection Notice Disconnection notices allow the customer 14 days notice. This year, DEO is extending an additional 10 days.

Medical Certificates Medical Certificates can assist a customer with placing a hold on a disconnection for up to 21 days. This year, once approved, there is a 30 day credit hold placed once customer is entered into the 1/9 payment plan program.

Tremont History Project remembers the Thanksgiving Day High School Football Classic

This story is a history lesson for those too young to remember, and is a fond memory for those old enough to know of those years. It includes tales of a powerful Lincoln High School football team that dominated for a few years during the early days of World War II.

The Charity Game, as it was called, was designed as a one-time-only event in 1931 to raise money to bring some much needed holiday joy and basic necessities to the poor and the needy struggling during the Great Depression. The organizers realized that first game was a huge hit and it's ability to raise money for charity was limitless. It started a Thanksgiving tradition in Cleveland that would become the single biggest sporting event in the city's history.

From 1931 to the final game in 1968, more than 1.3 million high school football fans would begin their Thanksgiving holiday by taking in one of the best high school football games of the season. The Charity Game set every attendance record for high school football in the state of Ohio, and in 1946 hosted the second largest crowd ever to watch a high school football game in the U. S. Hundreds of thousands of dollars were raised for the needy.

From the start of the "The Senate" League and the city of Cleveland league around 1905, the East Side teams dominated area high school football. WWI and the 1918 flu epidemic took its toll on high school football.

The first Charity Game was held on Saturday, Nov. 28, 1931, was sponsored by The Plain Dealer and benefitted its Give-a-Christmas Fund, and was played by the two leading teams from the various high school football leagues around the Cleveland area. The first two teams to play were Central High School from the Senate League and Cathedral Latin from the Catholic League. Latin won the game by a score of 18 - 0. In the process Latin won the Cleveland interscholastic football championship of 1931. Net revenues from the game came to \$8,220.25 which went to charity.

In 1933 ANY team in Cuyahoga County would be eligible to play in the Charity Game. The East Side teams also dominated the Charity Game whether they were the Catholic League or the Senate League or other. In the early 1930's there were ties when two trophies had to be given. In 1937 the Senate was divided into East Side and West Side League plus the four Catholic High Schools joined the Senate League along with Rhodes, John Marshall and John Hay. The

game would be played on the Saturday after Thanksgiving for the next 15 years. Cathedral Latin in 1938 had won their third Charity Game and third outright city championship in the last eight years.

1940 marked the 10-year anniversary of the Charity Game. As mentioned earlier, the East Side teams dominated mainly because most of the people in the city lived there so the teams had more students from which to draw, and they tended to have better coaches.

Lincoln High School, a competitive team since the middle 1930's was knocking on the door. In 1941, coach Glen Fraser's Lincoln team did not have a regular gridiron to practice on so practiced on a field under the Clark Avenue bridge. The team had to clear the field of rocks, tin cans, broken glass and had to cut what grass there was in order to give themselves a decent place to practice.

Lincoln High made it to the Charity game against a tough Collinwood team. It was reported to be a very exciting game, but ended in a 12 - 12 tie, leaving both Lincoln and Collinwood as Cleveland's co-champions. A West Side school still had yet to reign alone as the city's top team. In 1942 the Lincoln Presidents would again assert their dominance and take the next big step. The 1942 Charity Game would be a rematch of the 1941 city title game. Both were undefeated. The game ended with a 26 - 0 Lincoln victory. This time they were all alone at the top. They were the first west side team to win a Charity Game in the 12-year history of the event. Collinwood was held to only 22 net yards of offense (all-time low in the 39-year history of the Charity Game) and they completed only three of 18 pass attempts. Its 11 net yards rushing was also an all-time Charity Game low.

In 1943 Lincoln's opponent in the Charity Game was Cathedral Latin. Lincoln's 29 straight games without a loss broke the old Cleveland record of 27 in a row set by the East High teams of 1905-1909. Cathedral Latin's amazing record in the city championship games remained in tact. They won over Lincoln by 18 - 12. The Cathedral Latin 1944 team was even more dominant as they met a tremendous and excellent Lincoln team again in the Charity Game. This year Latin won by 33 - 0.

Lincoln High continued to dominate the West Side League. The Charity Games were held on Thanksgiving Day, the changing times of the 1960's and the downtown area, the drop in attendance, viewing on TV of college games, move to the suburbs and out of Cleveland schools, combining of schools (Lincoln and West High, etc.), and various additional reasons caused the end of the Charity Game.

Of Note: 2019 was the second year for the special four-year series: Focus on the Artists – which spotlights and celebrates minority and under-represented artists that contribute greatly to our community and NE Ohio. The inaugural year of the series, 2018, featured Sin Fronteras/Beyond Borders: Celebrating Latino Visual and Performing Artists in Cleveland and NE Ohio to wide acclaim. This year's spotlight also included LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) artists in a special Freedom and Love: 50th Anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising exhibition featuring

special galleries for the series' Established and Emerging LGBT Artists. We also welcomed the return of Sin Fronteras/Beyond Borders: Celebrating Latino Visual and Performing Artists in Cleveland and NE Ohio. Items Needed: Canned goods, nonperishable boxed food items, paper products (toilet paper, paper towels, napkins)

Counting: Food and paper products are counted individually – unless they are cellophane wrapped and sold as a set (example a four-pack of paper towels) is counted as one item not four. Canned goods and individually wrapped paper products count as one item each.

Cash/Checks: You may also donate by cash/check if you prefer. Checks must be made out to the food pantry of your choice – however, to count in the competition, for verification purposes, checks must first be delivered to the block club food drive coordinators, or to the Tremont West offices (2406 Professor) – who will deliver them to the respective food pantries.

Drop-off points: Block club members can deliver food/paper products to their block club food drive coordinators (a listing and contact info will be sent out by e-mail and listed in the December Inside Tremont - or dropped off at the Tremont West offices – 2406 Professor – Monday – Friday during regular business hours. ***Items dropped off at Tremont West must include the name of the block club for them to count towards the block club's totals***

Deadlines: For delivery before the holidays, items must be turned in by Friday, December 13th. A second delivery will be made in mid-January, 2020 for items donated after Dec.14th. (NOTE: The Tremont West offices are closed December 21st - January 1st and will reopen on Wednesday, January 2nd). Deliveries during that time can only be made to your block club coordinators and not to the Tremont West office.

Three competitions this year:

1. Canned Goods & Non-Perishable Boxed Food Items and Paper Products - the block club collecting the most items in this category receives a \$50 prize donation to their block club treasury/account
2. Cash and Check Donations (dollar for dollar) - the block club collecting the most money also receives a \$50 prize donation to their block club treasury/account - and -
3. Grand Prize Winner – the block club's cash & check donations are doubled (ex: \$50 turns into 100 items) and canned goods and non-perishable items collected are added (ex: \$3,000 in checks/cash becomes 6,000 items + 500 canned goods = 6,500 items) – winning block club in this category receives a prize of a \$100 donation to their block club treasury/account.

Most important of all is the goal: lending a helping hand to neighbors – families and children - in need in Tremont, Duck Island, and Irishtown Bend - and providing help to support the outstanding work of eight Cleveland food pantries-ministries – St. Augustine Church, Pilgrim Congregational Church UCC, Immanuel Lutheran Church, St. John Cantius Church, St. Michael Church, St. Malachi Church, Greater Cleveland Foodbank, and

Westside Catholic Center – who get nutritious food to children and families all year long!

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

Auburn-Lincoln Park

In October, safety concerns were addressed with the 2nd District Community Services Officer, Sgt. Philip McClain. Sgt. McClain reported on traffic citations at the stop sign at W11th and Starkweather and recent arrests of package thief. Please report any theft or crime, however small, so that the 2nd District can be aware of activity. Dr. Andrew Cox, Director of Access and Community Engagement at Tri-C, presented the Tri-C programming Levy that will appear on the November Ballot. Get out and VOTE! There was a brief update on the Towpath Trail. Construction on Stage 4 along University Road and Carter Road began on October 16th with completion of this stage projected for Spring, 2021. Update from a letter from the Tremont History Project shared some of this historical significance of the rectory house at W14th and Kenilworth. Landmarks Commission voted recently to deny the proposed demolition of the house. The developers of the Tremont Flats apartment project will return to the block club when they have new plans that incorporate the rectory home. Duck Island

At the October meeting, Sgt. Pat McClain from 2nd District Community Policing came to talk about safety concerns in the neighborhood and asked for input from the neighbors. A neighbor asked about the rules governing electric scooters, and the officer confirmed that scooters are meant to be used on the street in the bicycle lane. It was noted that most of problems with scooters in the neighborhood were seen on Abbey Avenue, and Sgt. McClain said he would notify the traffic division to keep an eye out. It was mentioned that this is a six-month trial of the scooters here in Cleveland, and that if anyone has input on whether they should remain available, they should reach out to Councilperson McCormack. A question was asked about the abandoned building on Willey that was mentioned at the last block club meeting. The officer said he would drive by the building and ask for a board-up by the City of Cleveland, if appropriate. Tremont West Housing and Economic Development Director, Khalid Hawthorne, came to give an update on the development project at W 20th and Lorain. Phase I of the development has been transferred to a new developer team and a 4-5 story residential project with about 200 apartment units (600-800 sq. ft), with market-rate rents. The intention is to avoid the very high rents associated with larger apartments (1100-1400 sq. ft). Questions were asked about how the traffic flow at that intersection will be handled, as traffic quickly backs up in the morning with the current resident population. Concerns were also raised about residents of the new building using W 18th St to avoid the traffic lights on W. 20th. It was asked whether the Phase I developers will contribute to the DI development fund -- Hawthorne said he would bring it up in his next meeting with them. John Zayac noted that the second phase of the project will still involve Brickhaus Development and will be completed at a later time. A question was asked about the development project at W 25th and Lorain at Market Plaza and Hawthorne noted that the plans have not changed, and the developers are in negotiation with various government entities regarding financial incentives. A vote was taken for the garage project at 2226 W 20th St, which was presented at the September meeting. The vote was unanimous in support of the variance. Michael Horton from Horton Harper architects presented on the project at 2270 W 19th St. A question was asked about easements for the shared driveway, which is split between the two properties. The easements are built into the deeds. A discussion was had about whether to vote on variance support for the projects that were presented for the first time at this meeting or to follow the recommended procedure of presentation at a meeting, and then voting on variance support at the next meeting. It was decided to vote on variance support for all three projects after much heated discussion. Variance

support was approved for the project at 2270 W 18th St. Wes Harper from Harper Horton Architects presented the projects at 2035 and 2039 W 18th St, which are requesting variances for lot size and rear yard depth. A question was asked about the parcel north of the proposed home at 2035 W 18th St. Horton explained that was the county parcel that comprises the hillside along the Hope Memorial Bridge. Support of the variances was approved. Final voting for the Duck Island logo was held and one of the four finalists was chosen. Scott Rosenstein reviewed the voter registration deadlines and reminded everyone about the upcoming General Election on November 5th and the Primary Election which will be held on March 17th in 2020. Early voting and absentee voting were highlighted as options for the spring, as the election will be on St. Patrick's Day. At the October meeting, Sgt. Patrick McClain of the 2nd District Police Community Services Unit took residents' safety concerns. We had invited Streets Commissioner Rob Mavec and the City's Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator, Calley Mersmann, for a follow-up presentation/discussion on bike lanes and other traffic concerns on Scranton Road shared by the membership at meetings earlier this year; both had prior commitments and could not attend; however, they offered to come to update us at a future time. Tremont West's Executive Director, Cory Riordan, reported he had sent an e-mail noting that in light of the fact that questions were posed in July and the block club has not yet received answers to their concerns, he asked that the City suspend the implementation of bike lanes on Scranton through the MetroNorth Block Club area at this time. This will ensure that bike lanes are not added to the street without proper community process. Director Riordan then joined the membership in a discussion about bike lanes and bike transit and fielded members' questions and concerns. Cleveland Ward 14 Councilwoman Jasmin Santana, who was unable to attend the meeting due to another commitment, sent word that she would be drafting a letter opposing the designated bike lanes on Scranton between Valentine and Clark Ave (based on feedback from the community), and that she will be getting in contact with everyone possible at the City to hear these concerns. Metro North thanks Councilwoman Jasmin Santana and TWDC Director Cory Riordan for hearing residents' concerns and advocating on our

behalf. There was also some preliminary planning for the upcoming annual Holiday Food Drive. Once again, Mary Ann Balog and Angela Guy will serve as the block club's Food Drive Coordinators. Our thanks to Mary Ann and Angela! Scott Rosenstein reminded our membership that the General Election is coming up on Tuesday, November 5th. Efforts for the Lucky Park Mural project have been stalled as the St. Theodosius Church Council continues to not have or make time to hear the project proposal. The current design concept requires their support as the property owner. SoJ members are encouraged to begin thinking of alternate ideas, if needed. A brief update on the next stage of the Towpath, along the norther edge of Tremont, was made as construction is scheduled to start this month and continue through mid-2021, per the notice of construction provided. As this year's School Supply Drive focused on Tremont Montessori's gym class, one of the requested items was pedometers. Members John and Randi Zubin proposed a bulk buy opportunity they have available. The block club is encouraged to consider the idea. With the annual Tremont Holiday Food Drive coming soon, the group was reminded that volunteers to serve as the SoJ coordinator(s) would be appreciated. The block club heard a proposal from the potential homeowner for a new construction, three story, single family home of nearly 2,700 square feet, with a front loading garage on a vacant parcel at 2443 Thurman. The proposal includes three foot side yards, a four foot rear yard, with preliminary floor plans. Construction would likely not start before spring of next year. Variances requested relate to the front loading garage, square footage of the house compared to the lot size, rear yard depth, and proximity to adjacent neighboring structures. Adjacent property owners were present representing an older home to the south and recent construction to the north. They raised several questions and concerns, which included impact to existing power lines in the rear, impact to sunlight, proximity to existing structures, location of windows, and size of the house relative to the lot size. A lively discussion was had. Khalid Hawthorne of TWDC was present and noted the zoning code variances being requested are the same as requested for construction of the adjacent house to the north. With quorum present, a motion was made and seconded to support the variances requested. The block club vote resulted in a letter of support for the project. Finally, Scott Rosenstein, organizer of the Tremont Arts and Culture Festival, requested that block club members Scott Nagy and Mike Koski be recognized for their volunteer contributions at this year's event. The meeting adjourned with a social hour to follow. 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The Movement Project Cleveland Dance Fest

After three successful years, The Movement Project is at it again...the Cleveland Dance Fest is here! On November 8th & 9th, 2019, this 2-day festival will feature new works by Cleveland and visiting artists in two evening performances, an emerging works concert, a youth showcase and a day of master classes for youth and professional dancers taught by some very exciting Cleveland Dance Fest artists and companies.

True to nature, I knew I had to talk with at least a few of this year's wonderful artists, and really get a feel for their work.

MVment, a female duo from Pittsburgh, is comprised of Maddison Mannolis and Alison Vitale. Their highly athletic work, quick, recover is energized and full of intention, mixed with slow control, and will be performed Saturday, November 9th during the Show 2 performance. The slower sections are Tai-Chi-like in quality, a discipline that inspired them in college, "Slippery Rock University has incredible faculty that always pushed us to find different ways to move," Mannolis says, "Specifically, our modern teacher, Teena Marie Cuter, had both of us focus on working in the realm of Tai-Chi like movement during a specific semester." Often, the pair works simply but efficiently; they will each give each other a set of tasks, work separately, then meet to see how their ideas can mesh together. The result is the dynamic movement quality you see onstage. Feeding into this is Mannolis and Vitale's background in contact improvisation, which they find integral to their partnering, "Contact improvisation is a style that comes very naturally to both of us," Mannolis explains, "We love how organic the movement can flow through our bodies when they connect [...]. Overall, we are fascinated by the span of control two bodies can have together through balance, opposition, and low to high levels."

At its core, the piece is an exploration of how both Mannolis and Vitale identify themselves as dancers and as humans, and their choreographic processes make that possible, "We have spent a lot of time explaining to one another how we feel and how we fit in as dancers," she says, "Together, we both identify as strong, independent female dancers. The presence of that model naturally comes to life on stage, due to the comfort we have knowing one another's struggles, perseverance, and like-minded attitudes."

Elyse Morckel, TMP veteran, has submitted something different this year. With the growth of the festival, a Youth Showcase has been added to the roster for Saturday evening (November 9th), and Morckel made sure her students at Dianna Durkin

Dance Studio were taking part, "For this piece we began with three large extended phrases which I drew from to create more gestural sequences that I typically incorporate into my work," Morckel explains, "Since we did not start the piece from any particular point [...] it gave us more possibilities to determine where the work could go, [and] I think that the open ended development process, along with having the dancers possess some agency over the movement [...] made the cast feel more invested in the choreography." Jennifer Sandoval-Eccher, the choreographer behind Marquee Dance Project's Reflections Between Two Worlds, looked at her process collaboratively as well, "I'm working with a group of intelligent movers who have contributed greatly to this piece not only as movers but as critical thinkers," she says, "In rehearsals we discuss the sections both physically and emotionally so that we can be as authentic as possible." Finding time to really discuss the work is important to Sandoval-Eccher's process, so that her movers can contribute to the overarching goal of the piece. On top of the discussion, the process also included a little improvisation, "[W]e incorporated improvisational techniques as a way to generate movement. We built a level of trust that allowed us to perform with a sense of vulnerability," she explains, "These artists I worked with embraced this journey with so much conviction, I feel honored to share the stage with them." Reflections Between Two Worlds is the result of this collaborative effort. The dancers weave, push, and pull around each other, an embodiment of the theme on the dynamics between discord and harmony. Rather than take a path of reconciliation, however, Sandoval-Eccher pushed the two oppositional forces further, "[T]here is not [reconciliation within the piece]. The duality of discord and harmony is a continuous cycle, at least this is how we wanted to leave it."

This work will be performed Friday, November 8th, during our Show 1 performance. Jennifer Sandoval-Eccher is a returning artist to the Cleveland Dance Fest...in 2016 she was part of the 1st officially kick off of Cleveland Dance Fest, which took place at The Breen Center in Ohio City. "Cleveland Dance Fest is a wonderful opportunity for local dance artists to connect and share their experiences through technique classes and performances. I was honored to be a part of the first year and feel the organization has kept with their structure of building an eclectic line up of dance artists," she says thoughtfully, "I feel the growth has been through the master classes and inviting artists outside of the Cleveland area. Although Cleveland does have a vibrant dance



community I feel it's important to build connections outside of your neighborhood." Take a moment to look at the rest of our Cleveland Dance Fest 2019 line-up below and check out the performance details!
