Stage 4 of the Towpath Trail in Tremont Ribbon Cutting Wednesday, June 9th, 2pm at Camp Cleveland

Stage 4 of the Towpath Trail includes the pedestrian bridge over Literary Avenue heading north to Canal Basin Park. Tremont West and the Tremont community cannot thank the four partners enough for creating and following through on the vision of the Towpath Trail in Cleveland. Tremont happens to be the only neighborhood the Trail runs through in our city, although there are a growing number of connector trails. This new amenity is generational in scope and will impact on how Tremont will continue to grow and thrive. The four partners are Canalway Partners, City of Cleveland, Cuyahoga County and Cleveland Metroparks. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

The celebration of the new Trail will happen on Wednesday, June 9th, 2pm at Camp Cleveland. The community is welcome to come out and celebrate.

Camp Cleveland pictured above and also included is the "old secesh cannon." From The Encyclopedia of Cleveland History: The secesh cannon is a confederate rifled artillery piece captured by Cleveland troops early in the Civil War. Federal forces commanded by Mjr. Gen. George B. McClellan were successful in thwarting a Confederate invasion of western Virginia. The Confederates left behind most of their supply wagons and "one fine rifled piece of artillery," which was captured by the Cleveland Light Artillery, one of Battery A's constituent units.


The cannon was brought to Cleveland during welcoming-home ceremonies on 29, July 1861. The cannon was displayed on Cleveland Public Square

after the war and when the Cuyahoga County The Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument - Cleveland, Ohio was dedicated in 1894, it was eventually repositioned on the sidewalk, but then it disappeared, eventually being found in a city dump.

Cleveland attorney John Crossen obtained title to the cannon from the City of Cleveland in 1959 and transferred the right of possession to the Cleveland Grays.

The iron barrel with a 3-inch bore was manufactured in 1861 for the state of North Carolina and it may be the only surviving captured Confederate cannon in existence in any major northern city. <http://ech-dev.case.edu/cgi/article.pl?id=SC2>



This image of the northern section of what was then Ward 13 of Cleveland depicts the names of north-south streets prior to the city's transition to numbered streets in 1906, however parcel addresses are not shown on this map. 


Free Home Repair

The Age-Friendly Home Investment program administered through the City of Cleveland's Department of Aging is now available. The program helps seniors over the age of 60 or adults between the ages of 18-59 with a disability address one home maintenance or home repair need. The program also assists with additional referrals to other home repair programs. The program is first come, first serve, with a limited amount of funding per ward. To qualify, residents:

- Must be a low or moderate income Cleveland homeowner aged 60 years or older or an adult age 18-59 receiving disability.
- Residence must be a single or two-family home that the applicant owns and resides in.
- Property taxes are current or applicant is on a payment plan.
- Property must not be in foreclosure.

The Block Club did not meet in the month of May due to the April meeting being later in that month. We requested members participate in the 2021 Riversweep clean-up. This year the Block Club thru TWDC requested adding the areas underneath the overpasses on Kenilworth and Starkweather. Two years ago ODOT’s District 12 maintenance manager made a judgement call that the Neighborhood Agreement from 2004 actually did not clearly state in writing the removal of leaves and litter. So for the past two years ODOT only washed the areas underneath the bridges down and mowed the area inside the right of way fencing just once a year in May. On Saturday May 8th several dozen volunteers from the Block Club, residents in the Sustainable Community Associates buildings, and other Tremonters removed over 150 bags of leaves, debris, litter, and broken glass under both overpasses. Significant thanks goes out to Josh Rosen for his leadership from SCA, and to Chris Lieb from the Taphouse who brought his combination weed whacker and leaf blower and worked his tail off to beatify these areas. The overpass areas had seen a 1000% increase in pedestrian traffic especially while walking dogs, the importance to keep these areas well maintained is critical to the Tremont’s vibrancy. Members were encouraged to participate in the TWDC Annual Meeting on May 20th, and if they are members of TWDC to vote for TWDC Board members. Councilman McCormack arranged a public meeting on May 24th at the Tremont Taphouse to cover several topics. The meeting will include Traffic Engineering, Division of Waste, and Public Safety. The primary topic is the debate over changing West 18th Place to one-way from Brevier to Starkweather, and (short) Starkweather to be one way east. Over the past year there has been issues with waste removal on West 18th Place, supervisors contacting the Police and issuing parking tickets to cars parked on the street. The secondary topic will be the Division of Waste continually using trucks that have rotted bottoms that leave glass and metal shards each and every place the truck is stopped and the employees compact the trucks. Traffic Engineering will look at the impact of the new parking lot design and in and out traffic patterns that are planned within the Tremont Taphouse expansion projects. Our next Block Club meeting will be Monday evening June 7th at 6PM on the patio of the Tremont Taphouse. We will hear updates on the Lincoln Building apartment complex. SCA will also propose 20 new town-home units on West 17th opposite the Fairmont Creamery. SCA will also give an overview of the three town-homes that will be planned for Scranton and Auburn as part of the Tappan Building project. The Block Club has already approved the three town-homes within the Tappan project. We will also hear the plans regarding the Scranton Carriage House project, that was approved during COVID restricts last year on the corner of Scranton & Kenilworth. Request has been made to the Housing and Economic Development Committee to write a letter to Prosper Cleveland, a real estate investment provider that has been buying up many homes in South Tremont, Clark-Fulton, and some suburban neighborhoods. Prosper purchases and renovates the properties, then re-sells them to out-of-state investors. Prosper Cleveland then offers these investors ongoing property management including leasing and sales services. The quality of the renovations has been poor – totally removing architectural and historical significance from the homes and poorly maintaining them. They often fail to pull necessary City permits or meet inspections. Neighbors requested the Committee to send a letter asking Prosper Cleveland to stay out of the neighborhood or commit to respectful and appropriate renovation practices. The Committee will author a letter and refer it to the Tremont West Board of Directors for their review at the Board’s June meeting. North of Literary

The block club met via the Zoom platform – online and by phone on Tuesday, May 18th. Officer Neagu, Second District Cleveland Police Community Services Unit, discussed safety issues. One recurring issue is the parking on W. 6th Street. The street was one-way, is now two-way, and there is some confusion as to what side and what direction cars should be parked. Apparently, someone got a ticket for parking in the wrong direction (no clear signage). The consensus ...including Officer Neagu, NOL members, and later Councilman McCormack...is that the ticketed person should appeal and will prevail. Councilman Kerry McCormack was available to address concerns. Residents on W.6th were canvassed to determine whether they prefer resurfacing to be brick or black-top. With a 25% response, it seems they might prefer a black top, although no decision has yet been made. It takes more time and resources to resurface with bricks...and bricks are hard to come by these days. Another on-going problem that was discussed is the patrolling of the Towpath. People have frequently observed vehicles on the Towpath that don’t belong there and that could be a danger to walkers and bicyclers. Amanda mentioned that anything that can go over 15 mph is not allowed. We discussed the placing of barriers, better signage, and additional patrolling. The fact that the Metroparks System has not yet officially taken over control from the city is making the issues more difficult to address. Once the transition is complete and Metroparks has complete control, enforcement of rules should be easier. The Councilman gave an update on the gang members that have terrorized Tremont and surrounding areas. Most of these individuals have been apprehended and others have been identified. Sadly, most are juveniles. May 24th is the first court hearing for some of them. Our next guest was Mera Cardenas, Executive Director of Canalway Partners, a non-profit group involved with Towpath Trail. She discussed rules and safety concerns. Mera pointed out that Metroparks rangers are more likely to be familiar with areas of the Towpath...especially in more isolated places...than Cleveland police. So, if someone encounters a problem, a ranger can probably respond more quickly. Amanda mentioned that a better ID system is needed for the Towpath. It seems that Mera can be influential in helping iron out some of the Towpath issues and make it more user-friendly. Deb Smith, with Clean Garbage Recycling (a Tremont-based resident led initiative), discussed on-going efforts to recycle aluminum, steel, and paper in Tremont. As of now, there seems to be no recycling availability for glass or plastics. Deb is trying to convince the Greek Church to continue to allow the paper retrievers to remain in their parking lot. Every other Wednesday Clean Garbage will provide curbside pickup and they will pick up large items if called. For more specific info, they can be contacted at: cleangarbagerecycling@gmail.com. 1. When can we go back to our Post meetings? Not willing to make that decision quite yet. However, Eric and Briana Ishida have volunteered their yard for our summer barbeque! We may have our next meeting in the park.
2. The Annual Membership Meeting of Tremont West is Thursday, May 20th.
3. The Tremont Farmer’s Market is back...every Tuesday from 4:00 PM until 7:00 PM until October.
4. COVID restrictions on city gatherings are still in place, but permits are now being considered on a case-by-case basis. Taste of Tremont will not happen, but Arts in August and the Tremont Arts and Cultural Festival may take place. The next NOL meeting will be on Tuesday, June 15, 2021, 6:30 PM. South of Jefferson



Hernias are common in both men and women. About 5 million Americans each year develop a hernia.

The bulge can occur because of a natural weakness in your abdominal wall. It also can occur if you strain your abdominal wall by picking up something heavy, for example. The inner lining of your abdomen pushes through the weak area to form a balloon-like sac. Sometimes part of your intestine or abdominal tissue slips into the sac, causing pain and other potentially serious health problems.

Most hernias begin small, but get larger.

You might notice a lump in your abdomen or groin that can be pushed back in or disappear when you lie down. Laughing, coughing or straining may make it reappear. Other symptoms include:

- Pain, discomfort or dull ache.
- Pain when lifting.
- A vague feeling of fullness.

If you suspect a hernia, especially if it causes discomfort, see your provider for an evaluation.

"If the hernia is not causing pain or symptoms, it may not need to be repaired," says Timothy Barnett, MD, President of Cleveland Clinic Lutheran Hospital. "In many cases, hernia repair is a minimally invasive procedure. The surgery typically takes about an hour; most patients go home the same day and return to normal activities within a few days."

If surgery is recommended, it should be performed promptly to avoid the risk of abdominal wall damage and a potentially bigger operation.


