

Join in the Annual Holiday Food Drive for Our Neighbors in Need

This year, North of Literary Block Club is inviting other block clubs to engage in “friendly competitions” to see which group could bring in the most donations for three (3) categories in the annual Tremont/Duck Island/Irishtown Bend Holiday Food Drive – of nonperishable food items and paper products along with cash and checks. The ultimate goal is to help food pantries, like St. Augustine Hunger Center hot meals program, St. Augustine Parish food pantry service, Immanuel Lutheran Food Pantry, St. Michael the Archangel Parish Food Pantry – Iglesia de San Miguel Arcangel, St. Malachi Parish Back Door Ministry, Mega Church Resource Center Food Pantry, Iglesia Nueva Vida Food Pantry, Pilgrim Church Food Pantry, Westside Catholic Center, Greater Cleveland Food Bank and Hunger Action Network of Greater Cleveland to feed our near west families and children in need in the holiday season. The “Grand Prize Winner” for the 2020/2021 challenge was North of Literary – therefore, they are issuing the challenge for the upcoming 2021/2022 season.

Last season’s holiday food drive featured 507 canned goods, paper products, and non-perishable food items collected. Last season cash and check donations tripled from the drive in 2019/2020: The Holiday Food Drive raised \$40,741 in 2020/2021 compared to \$13,567 in 2019/2020 – representing an outpouring of generosity from our neighborhoods! This is an increase of 200% in the Donation Growth Rate between seasons – and the most money raised in cash/checks in any of the Holiday

Support Tremont Montessori’s Maker Space \$10 Ornaments on Sale at Many Local Businesses

Tremont Montessori has a new Maker Space, and they are using their tools to create Tremont ornaments as a fundraiser for school programs. Tina Kovach, Tremont’s computer science teacher, is using the school’s GlowForge to create the ornaments. The GlowForge was donated to Tremont through DonorsChoose.org which matched donations from Sonic, Google, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and generous donors like Doug Wang. “Tremont is very fortunate to have had wide-spread funding from our community. We’ve been able to create our own Montessori materials as well as laser cut student projects” said Tina. “The GlowForge was donated just as we were sent home from the pandemic and it saved us. We sent home fraction circles for the 6th grade as well as moveable alphabets for our youngest learners”. Students were able to design projects in virtual class and then either pick them up or have them mailed home. This year, they’ve used the GlowForge to create name puzzles for all the pre-k students, sewing boards for lower elementary, and lanterns for upper elementary and middle school. Just this week they created “Wild Thing” headbands for the lower elementary’s Great Lakes Theater residency. The sale of the Tremont ornament will help fund wood, paint and other supplies used school-wide at Tremont Montessori.

The ornaments are \$10 each and can be purchased in the main office during school hours, as well as La Bodega, Loop, and Hotz’s Cafe. We hope to offer the ornaments at other locations throughout Tremont. 100% of proceeds benefit school programs.

Food Drives!

Here’s How to Donate and the Guidelines for this Season’s Holiday Food Drive:

Items Needed: Canned goods, nonperishable boxed food items, paper products (toilet paper, paper towels, napkins)

Counting: Food and paper products are counted individually – unless they are cellophane wrapped and sold as a set (example a four-pack of paper towels) is counted as one item not four. Canned goods and individually wrapped paper products count as one item each.

Cash/Checks: You may also donate by cash/check if you prefer. A safe and efficient way to participate is to mail your check to Tremont West Development Corp., Re: Food Drive (2406 Professor, Cleveland, OH 44113) made out to the

food pantry of your choice, noting to which block club you belong.

How to give: Click donate, select an amount to give, choose your block club, choose which food pantry/hunger center you want your donation to be sent to, choose form of payment, and watch the competition between the block clubs unfold!

Suggestion: If your employer allows it – hold a Holiday Food Drive at your work, office, school or place of employment. All donations can then be brought over and donated in your block club’s name.

Did you know that the City of Cleveland, in partnership with Cleveland Neighborhood Progress and Neighborhood Connections, is the recipient of a \$476,000 grant from the Robert Woods Johnson Foundation? The goal of this 30-month initiative is to develop and implement community-based programs that support circular economy strategies and programs with a focus on health, equity and climate change. A circular economy aims to keep products and materials in use as long as possible, focuses on renewing and regenerating the land, looks to reduce pollution and waste, and creates local jobs.

Part of Phase I of the initiative, currently underway, is to fund local groups who are contributing to a circular economy. Tremont’s Clean Garbage Recycling is a proud recipient of one of these grants. CGR’s focus is scrap collection in Tremont. CGR will come to your home and pick up your scrap - things like old pipes, fencing grills, small appliances - anything that contains metal. This is a great way to involve a wider audience in doing good, collect more to benefit our neighbors in need and the local food pantries, and help your block club in the friendly competition.

Canned goods can be dropped off at the Tremont West offices – 2406 Professor Avenue – side porches - Monday – Friday during regular business hours - you may drop off food and paper product items on one of our two side porches at 2406 Professor Avenue. Please be sure to mark clearly on the donation to which block club your items should be counted in the competition. Checks should be mailed to Tremont West Development Corp., Re: Food Drive, 2406 Professor, Cleveland, OH 44113 – and made payable to the food pantry of your choice

Deadlines: For delivery before the holidays, items must be turned in by Wednesday, December 15th. A second delivery will be made in mid-January, 2022 for items donated after Dec. 15th. (NOTE: The Tremont West offices are closed December 24th - January 2nd and will reopen on Monday, January 3rd). Deliveries during that time can only be made to your block club coordinators or donation locations and not to the Tremont West office.

Three competitions this year:

Canned Goods & Non-Perishable Boxed Food Items and Paper Products - the block club collecting the most items in this category receives a \$50 prize donation to their block club treasury/account

Cash and Check Donations (dollar for dollar) - the block club collecting the most money also receives a \$50 prize donation to their block club treasury/account - and

Grand Prize Winner – the block club's cash & check donations are doubled (ex: \$50 turns into 100 items) and canned goods and non-perishable items collected are added (ex: \$3,000 in checks/cash becomes 6,000 items + 500 canned goods = 6,500 items) – winning block club in this category receives a prize of a \$100 donation to their block club treasury/account.

Most important of all is the goal: lending a helping hand to neighbors – families and children - in need in Tremont, Duck Island, and Irishtown Bend - and providing help to support the outstanding work of eleven Cleveland food pantries-ministries – St. Augustine Hunger Center hot meals program, St. Augustine Parish food pantry service, Immanuel Lutheran Food Pantry, St. Michael the Archangel Parish Food Pantry – Iglesia de San Miguel Arcangel, St. Malachi Parish Back Door Ministry, Mega Church Resource Center Food Pantry, Iglesia







Block Club Happenings

“Block Club Happenings” is compiled by Tremont West staff with direct input from Block Clubs.

Auburn-Lincoln Park

The block club met on Monday, November 15th via the Zoom platform - online and by phone. Sgt. Frank Woyma of the Second District Police Community Services Unit took residents safety concerns and gave a short update. 2nd District Police will be collecting new socks and underwear for adult homeless women and men. Items can also be dropped off at the Second District station or picked up from homes by contacting the Second District at 216-623-5209. A proposal for new construction of a single-family home at 1041 Auburn Avenue returned after initially being presented at the last meeting in October. Site plans and a Letter of Non-Conformance (variances needed) had been shared with the membership by email. After consideration and reflection members present voted unanimously to support the granting of variances by the Board of Zoning Appeals. A letter of support from the block club will be sent as soon as the property is confirmed to have transferred to the prospective buyer. Member Yvonne Bruce has been working to maintain and upgrade Lincoln Park. Yvonne reported via email that volunteers had their final summer Lincoln Park clean-up in October, and Yvonne thinks they will try to schedule these monthly events again next summer. In October Yvonne also sent an e-mail requesting additional trash cans and lids for the Park to various parties in the City of Cleveland, but hadn't heard anything back yet. At the meeting, the membership present requested that the letter be sent out to the block club membership via e-mail- with a request that members cut and paste the text of the e-mail and send it to officials in the City's Divisions of Waste and Parks Recreation and Properties, Director Cox who oversees the Public Works Division, and Ward 3 Cleveland Councilman Kerry McCormack requesting their assistance. Member Brooke Willis has advocated for burned out lights in Lincoln Park to be repaired. After a couple of attempts, it seems the City has repaired 7 - 8 of the lights - with only a couple not yet functioning. The block club thanks Brooke and Yvonne for their advocacy on our behalf! A brief overview of the November 2nd General Election was shared. Congratulations to Cleveland Ward 3 Councilman Kerry McCormack on his re-election to serve another 4-year term. The Annual Holiday Food Drive and friendly block club competition returns; please consider donating if able. Issues with traffic control at Scranton Elementary. Discussion on the Divergence Center, which officers have the option to send low level offenders to participate versus taking them to jail. Lucas Staib, architect for the Scranton Carriage Works project attended and made a small added presentation. The City of Cleveland Capital Projects stated the project will need an Encroachment Permit for the commercial space. Renderings of steps and a planter box were shown. Attendees had no objections and look forward to having a new retail space in the neighborhood. It was agreed to send an email that the Block Club is in support of the permit to the Office Of Capital Projects. The next hour of time was a presentation and Q&A with Cuyahoga County officials regarding the new 2021 property evaluations. Michael Chambers, Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer. Lisa Rocco, Director of Operations at Cuyahoga County. Lou Gentile, Manager of Commercial & Industrial Appraisals for Cuyahoga County. County Councilwomen Yvonne Conwell, and County Councilman Martin Sweeney were all present. Micheal Chambers distributed a handout packet for the 2021 Triennial Appraisal updates. Mr. Chambers gave a twenty minute presentation to the attendees present. The State of Ohio mandated a minimum 16% increase across the board in Cuyahoga County as an increase in property appraisal evaluations. The City of Cleveland went up an average of 23% for residential property. Individual evaluations were accomplished by aggregating sales per neighborhood from 2018 to 2020. Triennial year appraisals do not require each property to have an exterior inspection of each structure, land, and exterior buildings. The State requires such process to occur every six years by the County, the Sexennial appraisals will occur again in 2024. Tremont has 2086 land parcels. There was a total of 378 property sales in Tremont from 2018 to 2020. The Average sale during that period in Tremont was \$237,000.00. If property owners disagree with the Counties evaluations, you must fill out and complete a DTE -1 form and send it to the County between January 1st and March 31st 2022. You will then have a hearing with the Board of Revision to hear your evidence on why the evaluation is too high. You can still request comparable (sales) for your neighborhood from the County. The hearings will be scheduled over the year in 2022. The officials also discussed three pieces of legislation in 2021 in Columbus that could provide some relief for qualified property owners. Senate Bill 159, which would cap annual property tax increases for qualifying residential properties at 5%. House Bill 207, would increase the maximum income threshold from \$34,200.00 to \$37,500.00 to be eligible for your residential homestead exemption. This bill would include the homestead exemption increasing from \$25,000.00 to \$31,200.00. House Bill 357, which would index values exempted annually on the homestead exemption and tie it to (GDP). Cuyahoga County is in support of all these bills, so is the County Auditor's Association in Ohio. Both Yvonne Conwell & Marty Sweeney understand how the new property evaluations can have a negative impact of legacy property owners, low income and senior property owners, minorities, and others with limited resources to pay property taxes. Yvonne suggested we work with other property owners in other neighborhoods and take buses to the State House to advocate for change. Cory Riordan from TWDC stated the Tremont West Board of Directors understands legacy and long term property owners are vulnerable and plan on making Board Resolutions to City, County and State elected officials to prevent systemic gentrification. Dharma Valentin from TWDC committed to assist any block club member or resident in attendance starting in January 2022 at meetings in completing the County forms online during individual meetings. **The Block Club will have a Christmas Party on Wednesday December 8th at the Tremont Taphouse at 7PM. Early detection is key when it comes to treating lung cancer. When the disease is found early, 80% or more of the cases can be cured with radiation or surgery.

Screening for lung cancer with CT scans detects more early-stage cancers and decreases deaths from lung cancer by 20% in people ages 55 to 75 who are at high risk.

Talk with your physician to determine if you may be a candidate for lung cancer screening.


